

About 20 years ago we printed in the *folknik* a poem by Ed Bronstein. The picture is a copy of a several-centuries-old woodcut which shows some androgynous angels playing a variety of musical instruments.

Ed repeated the poem at my 84th birthday party and there was hardly a dry eye in the house! (A lot of old timers were there.)

# July 4 Campout—Boulder Creek

The SFFMC campout will once again be in the redwoods at the Boulder Creek Scout Reservation—the same place as last year's July 4th and Labor Day campouts. It's about a mile from Boulder Creek, off Bear Creek Road. The address: 250 Scout Ranch Road. See the attached flyer on the front of this *folknik* for a map.

**DATES:** The camp will be for three nights: Friday, July 4 beginning at 2:00 PM, Saturday, July 5, AND Sunday night, July 6. Leave Monday, July 7 at 11:00 AM. This is a new checkout time.

**New Rates:** Adults: \$18/night per person, kids under 16: \$8/night per person, up to two kids in a family. Additional kids in the same family are free. Day use: \$10/person.

**REGISTRATION:** Again, no advance registration. Register at camp only. It's first-come, first-serve for campsites and tent cabins. There are about 17 tent cabins, which are usually enough for those who want them.

#### **Activities**

**Jams and workshops:** Informal jams in the daytime and around the campfires at night, two nights of open mics, and varied workshops. We're planning workshops on various topics: two and three-chord songs, songs Faith sang, songs from *Rise Up Singing*, beginning guitar, and many more. Some suggestions: songs of the Carter family, Malvina Reynolds, Bill Staines, and instrument instruction.

Anyone can lead a workshop. If you'd like to lead one, or have suggestions for a topic, email Phyllis at folkniked@earthlink.net or sign up at camp at the workshop bulletin board near the registration table.

We will schedule them at camp.

**OPEN MICS:** Usually the second and third nights of camp, about 8:00 PM at the main outdoor amphitheater. A sign-up list will be at the registration table.

#### Howard Bert Schwartz May 6, 1943–Feb. 26, 2014

Howard passed away in his long-time Oakland apartment while a friend read him mystic poetry, ending a long confrontation with liver cancer, heart disease, and chronic digestive problems. He was a long-time member of the folk club who frequently attended the Friday night sessions at Faith's. He was well known for his ability to play accompaniment in the singing room, regardless of song or key. He also attended various other folk gathering in the Bay Area, and he played for numerous Sufi dance events.

Most of the local folkies are unaware of Howard's many other accomplishments. Howard was a professor of sociology for many years, beginning with a position at Harvard and moving on to other positions that seemed right to him. He was uninterested in prestige or a high salary, preferring work that spoke to his sense of authenticity. He described his specialty area, ethnomethodology, as the study of everyday and common-sense thinking. Recently a journal in England republished Howard's scholarly papers because they liked his work and felt it reflected the early foundation of that branch of sociology. With a friend, Howard co-authored a sociology text book, a text notable for the sprinklings of humor Howard insisted upon. It continues in use and is translated into multiple languages.

Subsequently he successfully transitioned into computer programming jobs. Long after he retired from that work, he continued to help friends with his techie skills.

Howard had many other sides to himself. His playful side delighted in entertaining people with his stock of magic tricks. With children he could interact at their level, without pretense and with mutual enjoyment. In earlier years he was an avid folk dancer and skilled tap dancer—the latter dating back to his days as a child actor. (He had significant parts in an episode of the TV series, Dragnet, and in the film, Marjorie Morningstar.) For many years he was active in the community of followers of the spiritual leader, Meher Baba, and he traveled to India several times to go to the Meher Baba center.

Encouragement of loving attitudes and community feeling motivated Howard throughout his life. Many of his friends were glad to share these qualities at a "Living Farewell" recognition event for Howard in April 2013.

#### Cyprian's—SFFMC's New Meeting Place

It was almost exactly three years ago that I first ventured in to the home of the San Francisco Folk Music Club's Friday night meetings at 885 Clayton Street. I had just started learning guitar and had never sung or played in front of others before. I sat in the singing room, my heart racing faster and faster as it got closer to my turn.

When it came to my turn, I stumbled through a version of Joe Hill that I had worked out, probably out of tune and off kilter in many ways, since I had yet to learn about tuners, and measures, and beats per measure, but the warmth and kindness with which my efforts were received was extraordinary and propelled me forward in a musical journey that feels like it has only just begun.

Everyone who, like me, was nurtured by and enjoyed the magic of 885 Clayton Street likely feels a certain loss. After all, nothing can replace the wonder and magic of 885 Clayton, but I have good news for you. The musical meetings have indeed found a warm new home at Cyprian's. The song circle is still going strong and continues to welcome and encourage all efforts to share and be a part of the music.

I'm proud to say, the warmth and acceptance of all contributions from beginner to accomplished musician is still very much a living value. Indeed, the song circle is larger than it was in the last days of 885 Clayton and continues to attract new folks each time. And, to top it all off, there are two other spaces with wonderful acoustics for those interested in jamming on second Fridays, and some fourth Fridays, when the song circle is downstairs.

On fourth Fridays, when it is the last Friday of the month, the folk club shares Cyprian's with an organization called VolxKuche (vokusf.org). They cook and serve a free vegan dinner to all comers in the downstairs space, and provide free entertainment as well. On those evenings, the song circle is held in the large upstairs space, with jamming in the chapel room, as well as jamming downstairs after the VolxKuche event is over. So far it seems like a perfect fit — music alongside tasty and healthy food for all.

At the event in March, the performers at the dinner were folk club regulars Ken Hayes and James Byfield. If you are interested in volunteering to perform for the dinner, you can contact the organizer at <info@vokusf.org>.

As magical as the musical meetings can be, the transition to Cyprian's did not happen magically. It has been an all volunteer effort that included the negotiations handled by members of the board, the work of a volunteer transition team led by Glen Van Lehn, the continued efforts of each and every individual who signs up for tasks that help each meeting run smoothly, and the many hands who don't wait to be asked to help out with set up and clean up. Not to mention the fact that everyone who can has been generously donating money each time to help pay for the cost of the space, as well as bringing food and drink to share.

Cyprian's may not be able to replicate the magic of 885 Clayton, but it is a warm new home with lots of potential for creating magical memories of its own. If you are a long-time folk club member and haven't been to Cyprian's, please come. If you've been there and haven't signed up to volunteer for one of the jobs, please do so, because it will not have a chance to succeed in the long run without consistent volunteers.

Glen and his transition team are just now beginning to work on written instructions for each job so that anyone who is willing can easily help out. If your schedule doesn't allow you to commit to a particular date or job, look for ways to help out while you're there, donate to the kitty, and consider bringing food or drink to share. And above all, if you are a

#### REID ON SEEGER, REDUX

It feels to me like Pete was always a part of my life. As a kid I listened to his records. When I was about 12, I went to a private summer-school program in an old farmhouse out in the country. They took us on field trips. I remember a day making a tour of Beniamino Bufano's sculptures around San Francisco, then winding up at his studio and having him show us around. One of our field trips was to the Berkeley Folk Festival, which took place at U.C. Berkeley, but it wasn't held in a concert hall. It was held in classrooms and hallways. I heard the bluegrass and old-timey music of the New Lost City Ramblers, with their lovely harmonies. I remember Dev Singh, who played the mouth bow.

But most of all, I remember Pete Seeger. Here was this man who sang and played his banjo and guitar and was having a world of fun while he was doing it. I think my father had recently told me that work was something you had to do, but you didn't like it. That had been his experience. My dad had been a professional football player who had to stop doing what he loved to go to work to support his family. Yet here was Pete, a guy who was having his day at the office, and it was fun! He was at work with meaning and expression. That changed my life—knowing that it was possible to do what you loved.

I encountered Pete again in Portland, Oregon, when I was 19. I saw him perform, and after the show I just walked through the curtain to talk with him. There was no one else around. He was very interested in what I had to say, which I discovered was not very much. There was not much Bob Reid for Pete Seeger to meet back then.

In the 1980s, after I had filled up my shoes a bit more, and I was making my way musically following that path I had seen Pete whistling down, a friend, Faith Petric, heard a new song I had written and encouraged me to attend the People's Music Network Gathering in Philadelphia. I again met Pete there, and I got the chance to sing my song to him, which changed my life. When I arrived home I got a letter written on a paper bag from Pete, and I began corresponding with him. He asked me to send him recordings of my songs. He began teaching people a song I wrote with a fifth-grade class at Aromas Elementary School about water on the Clearwater, the 100-foot Hudson River sloop, one of Pete's ideas come to life. We performed the song at the United Nations in 2003 and 2004 as part of their International Year of Freshwater. I often traveled east and was adopted by Pete's sweet and salty wife, Toshi, and I became part of their

large extended family. They taught me so much that my life has been bursting to use it and has become bigger because of it. Getting to travel, cut wood, sail, sing with Pete, and to watch Toshi operate her artistic touch with the telephone and food . . . I saw the power of their partnership and their love.

Pete told me many things, most I struggle to remember, but he said that the money that his music has brought in has allowed him to spend 10 percent of his time on music and 90 percent of his time on what is important.

#### CHARLIE KING, So Far, So Good

Vaguely Reminiscent Sounds, 2013; <a href="www.charlieking.org">www.charlieking.org</a>

This two-CD set is a collection of songs that Charlie King has written and performed over the last 40 years. They cover a wide range of topics, including labor, love, heroes, doofuses, war and peace, and more.

The opening song on the first CD, "Our Life Is More Than Our Work," encourages people to follow their dreams instead of slaving away at a dead-end job that drains them of life. A different take shows up in "The Dancing Boilerman," who practices his dance steps while keeping an eye on the boilers during his 12-hour shift.

Nuclear testing and power are touched on in "Acceptable Risk," the story of a participant in the openair nuclear tests in the 1950s and his struggle with radiation sickness, and "Acres of Clams," protesting the construction of the Seabrook nuclear power plant.

Songs of the political dark side include "Two Good Arms," a powerful song about the trial and execution of Sacco and Vanzetti; "Are You Now or Have You Ever Been..." about echoes of the McCarthy era; and Vietnam veterans "Trying to Find a Way Home."

A news story about a festival where Charlie performed pronounced that it was "Vaguely Reminiscent of the Sixties," which provided Charlie with the fuel to write the song of that title, one of my favorites. Another favorite is "Buy, Buy This American Car," pointing out how "American" some "American" cars are.

The second CD starts off with "Sing Mandela Free," celebrating Nelson Mandela's release after 27 years of imprisonment. This song becomes current again since Mandela's death. "Wrap That Rascal" is a call for men to practice birth control.

Some other titles on these CDs are "Bring Back the Eight-Hour Day," "Little Jewish Ladies for Buchanan," "Tinky Winky," "Terror on Sesame Street," and "If You Want Peace, Work for Justice."

The subtitle of the set is "40 Songs for 40 Years." Here's hoping for 40 more!

When I was in Chile, teaching English teachers in 2012, I learned much more about the story and quickly realized that the wives, mothers and sisters had saved the lives of the miners because they occupied the mine site and wouldn't leave.

The government was ready to give the men up for dead, but the women made such a stink that they realized it would be terrible PR. So it ended up with the women saving the men's lives and also getting good PR by doing so!

We plan to have the required lifeguard and open the pool on the second and third days from 1:00 to 5:00 PM (new hours).

**POTLUCK:** Community potluck Saturday night, 6:30 PM, at the outside dining area near the kitchen. We can use the camp's kitchen, with refrigerator and freezer, stove, oven and microwave, to store and heat potluck food. Also available in the kitchen are plates, silverware, pans, and serving utensils. All dishes, pots and pans need to be washed afterwards. Please pitch in and wash your dishes. Label any leftovers you want saved.

**IMPORTANT:** The kitchen must be kept cleaned up if we want to continue using it; this is a do-it-yourself chore for anyone who uses the kitchen at all.

**HIKING:** Several hiking trails begin at the camp: a self-guided historical trail about 3.5 miles long, and a nature trail about 2.5 miles long, among others.

**SFFMC T-SHIRTS:** will be for sale at the registration table at \$15.00 each. Newest color—burgundy—plus blue or maroon, in various sizes.

#### **Facilities**

The camp capacity is several hundred, so there is plenty of room. Many campsites have fire pits, and there is usually firewood available. Near the kitchen is an outdoor dining area and deck, picnic tables and umbrellas (and a machine with free ice).

Also nearby are the swimming pool, eight tentcabins with cots, and a bathroom with showers and flush toilets. At the bottom of the hill by the parking lot is a large flat site for tents—Cubland; bathrooms with flush toilets and running water are nearby. RVs are welcome; they park in the parking lot.

We cannot drive directly into campsites; we have to park vehicles in the parking lot or alongside the paved road and use carts provided by the camp to take our gear a short distance to the campsites.

The camp has neighbors directly across Bear Creek, so any music near the creek after 10:00 pm.—the usual curfew for noise—needs to be quiet. If you plan to sing late, please locate your circle as far from Bear Creek as possible, also at a distance from the ranger's house.

Everyone over 12 years old (except day-use attendees) does an hour per camp of duty: registration and parking, cleanup after the potluck, or camp cleanup on the last day. Please sign up at the registration table as soon as possible after arriving. And please show up for your chore. If you can't, leave a note at the registration table so we can cover the time.

#### **Sound Your Instruments of Power**

by Robert Rodriquez.

One of old Ireland's best known cycle of stories is that which involves the stalwart band of adventurers, heroes, and warriors known as the Fianna and their legendary leader named Finn MacCumhal. Even today their wondrous and heroic deeds are a part and parcel of the Irish narrative psyche and being, a sense of true magic to both ear and heart when these tales are still told and recited. The Fianna possessed many wonderful and fantastic objects and marvels, one of which was a horn known as the Barra-Bua, which was only to be blown in times of the direct of dangers and threats to Ireland itself. Such was its power and magic that, when blown, it could be heard the length and breadth of Ireland and was a signal that the greatest peril threatened both Ireland and the Fianna themselves. It was said that when women heard the sound of this horn, many would conceive right on the spot, and when young men heard the horn's call, even if they were making ardent love to their wives or sweethearts, they would drop everything and race to the side of Finn to save Ireland from whatever danger threatened it. Several centuries later, along the banks of the Danube and across the grasslands of Hungary, a chieftain named Lehel possessed a marvelous bugle that could only be used at times of extreme danger to the Magyar race. It was said that when he blew the bugle, the very rocks and mountains would cry out in agony and the very waters of nearby rivers and streams would moan in anguish, while other chroniclers stated that the bugle could summon a horde of long dead warriors to rise from their very graves and fight for the survival of the Magyar race in times of peril. The bugle was eventually destroyed in a major battle between the Magyar and the forces of the Holy Roman Emperor, but its legend lives on in ancient Magyar song and story.

A magical and other-worldly horn also plays a prominent and major in the great epic of France, the Song of Roland. It was said that when this horn was blown, it could be heard even at great distances, and at the very end of Roland's life, it was heard by the emperor Charlemagne many hundreds of miles away at the very moment Roland

took his last stand at the Battle of Roncesvalles against the Moorish hosts besieging his outnumber forces.

In a classic Russian tale, a wicked czar, wishing to gain access to the wife of his chief archer, sends him on a quest to obtain I know not what from I know not where. He comes into possession of a gusle, a musical instrument somewhat like a lute. When its first string is plucked, a vast ocean appears by magic; when its second string is plucked, a huge armada of ships suddenly materializes; when its third string is plucked, the armada's guns unleash a huge barrage powerful enough to knock down the walls of a fortress or even a city. The czar is eventually defeated when his very palace is demolished through the help of this magic gusle and he is foiled in his efforts to obtain the coveted lady in question.

And then there is the power of a musical instrument to affect nature itself, as demonstrated in Finland's Kalevala. When the musician Vainamoinen played his kantele harp, it could cause the sun and moon to leave their places in the sky to come down to earth and lodge in the tops of a birch and pine tree respectively. Unfortunately for both sun and moon, it would lead to both being kidnapped by the evil Luhi, mistress of the north, and it would take the heroics of the clever smith Ilmarinen to help restore light and warmth into the world.

In a tale from Vietnam, a poor wood cutter, with the help of a small instrument known as a butterfly harp, caused the emperor's daughter to laugh, speak and dance after she had been mute for much of her life. Because of this wondrous change in her behavior, he would eventually become emperor himself and the butterfly harp would become Vietnam's national instrument.

On the other hand, it is said among the Roma folk that their fiddle has the wondrous property that can make folks dance und weep and cry out for joy, all at one and the same time. Elsewhere I have referred to the ability of a musical instrument to cause folks to dance without stopping until an outside agency tells them to do so. The tales of this sort are so numerous and so worldwide as to be part and parcel of the human experience from time immemorial to the present.

This cuts across the board, from the smallest of creatures to the most powerful of cosmic deities, and the instruments themselves are too numerous al diverse to mention: from fiddles, bagpipes, and flutes to drums, harps, and whistles. Wherever there is music and wherever there is a story, there one will also find magic so deep and vital as to be constantly with us and around us all. May it always be that this very musical magic and power will never die, but will live on in us and with us for all times and days to come. So has it been since the beginning, and so should it be until the end of time,
