

Labor Day Camp—Boulder Creek Festival Of The Sea 2017

The 2017 SFFMC Labor Day weekend campout is once again in the redwoods at the Boulder Creek Scout Reservation—the same place as last year's July 4th and Labor Day camps. The address is 250 Scout Ranch Road, about a mile from Boulder Creek, off Bear Creek Road.

Dates: Friday, September 1, 2:00 PM; Saturday, September 2; and Sunday, September 3. Checkout is Monday, September 4, at 11:00 AM. (Note checkout time.)

If you arrive early (before 2:00 РМ Friday, September 1), please help to post signs, register campers and direct parking. (Contact Phyllis Jardine at folkniked@earthlink. net if you can help.)

2017 RATES: Adults: \$20/night per person; kids under 16: \$8/night per person, up to two kids in a family. Additional kids in the same family are free. Day use rate: \$14/person.

REGISTRATION: No advance registration; register at camp. First-come, first-serve for campsites and tent cabins—no reservations taken. There are about 17 tent cabins, which are becoming popular.

So far, there are no other groups registered for the Labor Day weekend, and we can choose whichever campsites we would like. If this changes, we will send a note on the Harmony list.

WARNING: Do not stack tent cabin mattresses on top of each other. The plastic covers are slippery, and stacking them has caused at least three accidents, one of which required transportation to a hospital.

CHANGES THIS YEAR: New Scout administration, a new ranger and a new requirement for renting the camp: a certificate in ServSafe, a food-handling course, for a person from our group. Thad Binkley has a ServSafe certificate, and the Board has urged that another person get one for a backup. Please contact Phyllis if you are interested in helping by getting the certificate. The brief course for the certificate can be taken on line. The Board will pay the fee of \$15.00.

Musical Meetings

Musical meetings of the San Francisco Folk Music Club are held every second and fourth Friday at Cyprian's ARC, 2097 Turk Street (at Lyon), San Francisco. Wanderin'

by Marlene McCall

I've heard this song a few times at jams and song swaps, but a couple of months ago, I heard someone play a beautiful version he got from James Taylor, and it got me wondering about the song's source. I haven't been able to find any attribution to an actual author or songwriter, so I guess it would be considered traditional by most people's definition of that term, but to the best of my calculation, which I explain below, it was probably written around 1915-1920. Here's some of the information I came across in my research:

Earliest Source I Found: Carl Sandburg

Carl Sandburg, on pages 188-189 of "Songbag", his 1927 anthology of American folk songs, says that he collected it from two people who had been on the American Relief Expedition to the Near East. But as far as I can tell, this song was not reported by any traditional music collector of that era except Sandburg. And although that source could suggest it was non-American in origin, the song sounds American. "American Relief Expedition to the Near East" seems to refer to the efforts of the organization that was originally founded in 1915 as the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief (ACASR), which was later renamed as the American Committee for Relief in the Near East (ACRNE), and even later renamed as the Near East Foundation, which is still in existence today. According to the Near East Foundation website, it was founded in 1915 for Armenian and Syrian relief, in response to the Armenian Genocide, and had nearly 1,000 U.S. citizens overseas building orphanages, vocational schools and food distribution centers from 1915-1930.

So it would seem that Sandburg's two sources presumably heard the song somewhere between 1915 and 1930. But since neither claimed to be the author, it presumably could have been written earlier. Also, since both of Sandberg's sources for this song's lyrics were from the state of New York – see more below where I discuss lyrics – I'm going to go out on a limb and guess that the songwriter was probably a non-professional singer songwriter from somewhere in New York State, maybe a returned World War I soldier – Roger McGuinn describes it as the lament of a post WW I soldier returning to hard times in America, but doesn't say where he got that info – and probably a hobo, as that term was coined in the 1890s.

If Roger McGuinn is correct about the WW I connection, then that would narrow down the timing of the writing to the period between 1915 and maybe 1920. But since I don't know why he says what he did, that's conjecture. He may have simply been referring to the song's character, who says, "I've been in the army..."

Gus Meade, in his Country Music Sources, cites no origin for this song earlier than Sandburg.

Lyrics from Carl Sandburg's Songbag

Carl Sandburg's 1927 info gave one musical arrangement for the song by Hazel Felman, together with two sets of lyrics, three verses from Arthur Sutherland of Rochester New York, and two verses from Hubert Canfield of Pittsford New York, listed in that order here:

My daddy is a engineer, my brother drives a hack, My sister takes in washin', and the baby bells the jack, An' it looks like I'm never gonna cease my wanderin'. I been a wanderin' early and late, New York City to the Golden Gate, An' it looks like I'm never gonna cease my wanderin'. Been a-workin' in the army, workin' on the farm, All I got to show for it is the muscle in my arm, An' it looks like I'm never gonna cease my wanderin'. There's snakes on the mountain and eels in the sea, 'Twas a redheaded woman made a wreck out of me, And it looks like I'm never gonna cease my wanderin'. Ashes to ashes and dust to dust, If whiskey don't get you, then the women must,

And it looks like I'm never gonna cease my wanderin'.

Recordings and lyric variations

Vernon Dalhart 1928. Several sources mentioned this record by hugely-popular country singer Vernon Dalhart as being the earliest recording. Full-fledged country rendition with guitar, banjo, fiddle, and harmonica. Released only one year after publication of Sandburg's Songbag, this record gives no composer/lyricist credit. It contains the first four verses from Sandburg, but adds these four more:

Sometimes I feel so awful blue
But what in the world am I gonna do? And it looks
I had a little gal, and her name was Betsy Ann
She left me flat and went back to Alabam.
And it looks...

I like blondes and brunettes too
But you never can tell what gals will do. And it looks...
I wander east and wander west
But I don't know which I like best. And it looks...

Frankie Laine? Someone in a Mudcat Café discussion mentioned that Frankie Laine had a pop record of "Wanderin" on juke boxes and on the radio in the late 1940s. But I wasn't able to find any other reference to this, nor was I able to locate an audio or video. So that mention on Mudcat could be inaccurate, or it could be that I didn't look far enough.

Sammy Kaye 1950. Sammy Kaye is actually the orchestra leader; the vocals are actually by "Tony Alamo and the Kaye Choir" according to the record label. This version uses the first three Sandburg verses, but also adds a bridge:

Toiling every day in the rain or snow As slowly down the highway of life I go Then at least I reach that final bend Oh, lord, where's it gonna end?

Josh White 50s—early 60s. This seems to me to be the definitive folk revival version, very much like most of the renderings I've heard in jams and song swaps and around campfires. It uses the first four Sandburg verses, with some minor variations. One of the variations is amusing, I think. Instead of "snakes in the mountains", he refers to "snakes in the ocean"! Interestingly, he also says, "from Singapore to the Golden Gate" instead of "from New York to the Golden Gate". Seems like a rather strange alteration unless he was personalizing it because he himself had been to Singapore. I wonder if that's it? He also added this verse:

My daddy longs to see me home, and my brother'd share his bed My sister yearns for me to have a roof above my head. And it looks...

Mike Saladin 1962. Believe it or not, here is a rock'n'roll version, obviously influenced (to my ears) by Buddy Holly and Elvis Presley, along with female background singers. This version uses the last three of Sandburg's verses, but also adds a bridge:

I can't eat from wanderin', I can't sleep from wanderin' My restless ways have brought me misery.

While doing a text search on the term "American Relief Expedition to the Near East", I came upon this interesting entry in the Catalog of Copyright Entries: Third Series. I feel fairly certain Mike Saladin (whom I've never heard of before) got that source information from Sandburg.

Dave van Ronk 1964. This version uses four of the Sandburg verses, with only one interesting variation. Instead of "There's snakes on the mountain and eels in the sea, 'twas a redheaded woman made a wreck out of me", he sings, "Train wreck on the mountain, shipwreck at sea; the red-headed woman made a wreck out of me." I like it!

Roger McGuinn. I don't think this was ever released as a recording. But it's available as a sound file on Roger McGuinn's website The Folk Den. Yes, Roger McGuinn of The Byrds. You can hear the full 12-string guitar treatment here. Roger says "I've interpreted it as a tribute to traveling and have written a few new verses to reflect my love of wanderin'". His version is the story of a wandering musician or minstrel, rather than a hobo. He uses the first two Sandburg verses

Actually I thought the festival was very well attended. I was surprised by how many people I saw throughout the day—in the halls, at the various workshops, and in the concert spaces. I didn't experience any workshops that were sparsely attended. In Harmony's Way (which I co-led) must have had fifty people or more—the room was packed.

While I don't play Quebecois tunes, I lingered outside that workshop because the room was full and the music leaking out into the hall was glorious. Shay's workshop about Expanding Your Song Repertoire was quite well attended as it always is. The Barbershop workshop had a fair number of people. Sea Chanteys/Sea Songs was very crowded as well. Robert's workshop of Songs of the Old West had a fair number of people. There were plenty of workshops and performances I didn't make it to, because I was attending other events, which is the sign of a good festival—there were plenty of things I wanted to do all day.

I saw a lot of new faces in those and other workshops, and hope they return to future Folk Club events.

My understanding of the food situation is that while the food vendor was reserved months in advance, the vendor cancelled and this was a last-minute replacement. Apparently a lot of food was still sold.

This was my first year attending at the new location, and I really like the place! It is fully handicapped accessible, a huge improvement from before. The facility is in much better condition and much more comfortable to use than the old location. There is more parking. Though I drove this

time, public transit to get there is much easier than in the old location. The school seems larger, which might make the event feel more spread out, but I suspect the number of attendees is similar to prior years. Also there are plenty of good restaurants within a short walk of the school, some even within one block.

Thanks again to all of the directors and the volunteers! I am looking forward to next year's event! Sing on! — Deborah Sandler

What music I heard was great, and I'm grateful for the pleasant day. Every year we see improvements we can make in future, and I'm sure next year I will be included with the liars.



gestions for a topic, e-mail Phyllis at folkniked@earthlink. net, or sign up at camp at the workshop bulletin board near the registration table. We will schedule them at camp.

OPEN Mics: Usually on the 2nd and 3rd nights of camp, 8:00 PM. The sign-up list is at Registration. If the main outdoor amphitheater near the kitchen is still under construction, we will probably use the site near the dining area that we used last year on Labor Day.

Swimming: Labor Day weekend is usually great swimming weather. We plan to have the required lifeguard and open the pool on the 2nd and 3rd days. Hours will be posted at the pool and near registration.

Potluck: A community potluck will be held on Saturday night, 6:30 рм, at the outside dining area near the kitchen. We can use the camp's kitchen-with refrigerator

and freezer, stove, oven and microwave—to store and heat potluck food. The kitchen also has plates, silverware, pans, and serving utensils. All dishes, pots and pans MUST be washed after use. Please pitch in and wash your dishes. Put your name on leftovers you want saved. Labels are usually in an envelope on the refrigerator.

IMPORTANT: The kitchen must be kept clean if we want to continue using it; this is a do-it-yourself chore for anyone who uses the kitchen at all. Please clean up promptly.

HIKING: Several hiking trails begin at the camp: a self-guided historical trail about 3.5 miles long, and a nature trail about 2.5 miles long, among others.

We are not allowed to drive directly into campsites. Park in the parking lot or alongside the paved road and use carts to take gear the short distance to the campsites. At the last report, the Scout camp carts on order had not arrived. If you can, bring a cart or wagon in case the carts do not arrive by the Labor Day campout.

The camp has neighbors directly across Bear Creek, so any music near the creek after 10:00 PM—the usual noise curfew—needs to be quiet. If you plan to sing late, please locate your circle as far from Bear Creek as possible and also at a distance from the Ranger's house.

Pitching In

Everyone over 12 (except day-use attendees) does at least an hour per camp of duty: registration and parking, cleanup after the potluck, or camp cleanup on the last day. (Extra hours are appreciated, especially for last day cleanup.) Please sign up at the registration table as

soon as possible after arriving. And please show up for your chore. If you can't, leave a note at registration so we can cover the time.

Facilities

The camp's capacity is several hundred people: plenty of room. Many campsites have fire pits, and there is usually firewood available.

Near the kitchen is an outdoor dining area and deck, picnic tables and umbrellas and a machine with free ice. (Note: sometimes the machine doesn't work well, so we advise bringing some ice, if you can).

Also near the kitchen are the swimming pool, eight tent-cabins with cots, and a bathroom with showers and flush toilets. At the bottom of the hill, by the parking lot, is Cubland: a large flat site for tents with nearby flushtoilet bathrooms and running water. RVs are welcome; they park in the parking lot.

Spread the word to all your friends who are interested in folk music! It is not necessary to be a member to attend, although we appreciate new memberships. Membership forms (for new members and renewals) will be available at the registration table and also from the link on our home page at www.sffmc.org.

Been across this country so many times before I'll never lose the feeling that's what God made me for

Been workin' in the city, workin' on the farm I always got a guitar underneath my arm Played most every country, played most every town Wanna keep on playing this whole wide world around

There's fish in the ocean, and eels in the sea And everywhere I haven't been, that's where I wanna be

James Taylor 1975. As he often does, James has changed the simple folk chords to make beautiful chord progressions, and accompanies himself with beautiful mellow fingerpicking. His lyrics are almost the same as Josh White, including the reference to "snakes in the ocean", but he modernized the language a bit. He also has an additional verse that I didn't hear anywhere else, so I'm assuming that he wrote this, although it sounds pretty traditional:

My ma she died when I was young My daddy took to stealing and he got hung.

Back in the late 60s and early 70s I went to a summer camp in the Adirondacks and they took us to Café Lena in Saratoga to hear the wonderful folk music and also to the Fox Hollow Festival outside Troy, New York. I have so many fond memories of those days. I remember hearing Rosalie during those days. She even came up to do a concert at our camp one summer, and her son Kevin was a camper one year. Our art shop counselor had Five Days Singing and Rosalie Sorrels albums that she played over and over. Those were good times. I also saw Faith at Café Lena one year and I trace my immersion in folk music to those times.

The river moves on, leaving loved ones on the shore. We can gaze back but they are lost to us, except in the memory and song.

Hearing of Rosalie Sorrels' recent passing brought back memories of the summer of 1967.

I was working for Folk Legacy Records in Hanksville, Vermont when Rosalie arrived with her accompanist Mitch Greenhill to record 'If I Could Be the Rain'. She told the story of her cross country drive and of bedding down late one night in a road side rest stop only to discover next morning that her bed was a poison ivy patch. She arrived with a severe case of the itch. Over the next week or so we all worked on the record, and she went through many bottles of calamine lotion.

Rosalie was an amazing singer. She never sang a song the same way twice. Every take was a unique experience. She and Mitch recorded simultaneously in the same room over the same mikes, so mike positioning had to be done very carefully. It was a slow way to work and put great stress on the artists but the end result was the capture of a real performance. Nothing was edited, added, taken away, or overdubbed. The resulting record is still in print and available from Folk Legacy. —Ray Frank
